Gardner's original version, first published in Salzburg as a mimeographed supplement to the emigre newspaper *Luch*, contains the verses commonly sung in Russian practice since the mid-nineteenth century: "Christ the new Pascha..." etc. (in settings by Turchaninov and other composers).
